Consumer Confidence Takes a Little Breather

Consumer confidence took its first breather of the year this week, slipping a notch from last week's record high, the latest ABC News/Money magazine poll has found.

Confidence still is soaring: Seventy-two percent of Americans rate the economy positively, tying last week's record. Sixty-one percent say their finances are in good shape. And 49 percent call it a good time to spend money.

INDEX - The ABC/Money Consumer Comfort Index, based on these three gauges, stands at +21 on its scale of +100 to -100, down one point. It had set record highs in each of the previous four weeks, as it surged from +11 at New Year's to +22 last week.

Regardless of this week's dip, consumer confidence is absolutely flying. Ratings of the economy are 39 points better than their average since this weekly poll began in late 1985. Ratings of the buying climate are 14 points better than average; ratings of personal finances, six points better.

Confidence has been surging just when Bill Clinton needed it, helping to boost his approval rating despite the White House sex scandal. The ABC/Money index is far above its lifetime average, -18. Credit the nirvana economy, with its growing wages, high employment and low inflation.

GROUPS - Confidence usually is much lower among women than men, but it's moved closer - now an eight-point gap in the index, compared to an average of 19 points over the last 12 months.

Confidence continues to lag in other economically vulnerable groups. The index is +28 among whites but -21 among blacks; +62 in higher-income households but -28 in the lowest; and +36 among people who've attended college but -13 among high school dropouts.

IRS - A wildcard question in this poll measures the level of public antipathy toward the Internal Revenue Service, and finds it considerable. Sixty-one percent of Americans say the IRS is "too harsh on average people" in enforcing the nation's tax laws; that's about twice the number who say its enforcement is "about right." And only four percent say the IRS is not tough enough on average taxpayers.

Here's a closer look at the three components of the ABC/Money index:

NATIONAL ECONOMY- A record-tying 72 percent rate the economy positively, unchanged this week. The worst was 93 percent negative in late 1991 and early 1992.

PERSONAL FINANCES - Sixty-one percent rate their finances positively, down one point. The best was 64 percent positive Aug. 3; the worst, 58 percent negative March 14, 1993.

BUYING CLIMATE - Forty-nine percent call this a good time to buy things, unchanged. The best was 52 percent May 11, 1986; the worst, 80 percent negative Nov. 2 and Oct. 28, 1990.

METHODOLOGY - The ABC News/Money magazine Consumer Comfort Index represents a rolling average based on telephone interviews with about 1,000 adults nationwide each month. This week's results are based on 1,016 interviews in the month ending Feb. 15 and have an error margin of plus or minus three percentage points.

The ABC/Money index is derived as follows: The negative response to each index question is subtracted from the positive response to that question. The three resulting numbers are then added and divided by three. The index can range from +100 (everyone positive on all three measures) to -100 (all negative on all three measures). The survey began in December 1985.
