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Confidence Inching Back Up

Consumer confidence moved up another notch this week, as gasoline prices moderated.

Following a decline in gas prices nationwide, 53 percent of Americans now rate the buying climate favorably, the most since early February and four points shy of the record in 14 years of weekly polls. It was six points lower in late June, as gas prices soared.

Sixty-seven percent of Americans also rate their own finances positively, three points shy of the record. Ratings of the national economy (71 percent positive) are farther from the record set in January, nine points.

INDEX - The ABC News/Money magazine Consumer Comfort Index, based on these ratings, stands at +27 on its scale of +100 to -100, up one point from last week and up from a low for the year of +23 on June 25. The index rose explosively in 1998 and 1999, but has lost steam since peaking at +38 on Jan.16.

Despite this retrenchment, confidence remains very high by historic standards. The index's lifetime average, depressed by recession in the early 1990s, is -10; it dipped as low as -50 in 1992 and averaged -44 that year. This year it's averaging +29.

GROUPS - As usual, confidence is higher among better-off Americans: The index is +60 in higher-income households compared to -19 in the lowest, +44 among college graduates but -1 among high-school dropouts, +31 among whites but 0 among blacks and +35 among men compared to +19 among women.

Here's a closer look at the three components of the ABC/Money index:

NATIONAL ECONOMY- The poll asks: Would you describe the state of the nation's economy these days as excellent, good, not so good or poor? Seventy-one percent say excellent or good, the same as last week. The record, 80 percent, was set on Jan. 16, 2000. The worst rating was seven percent in late 1991 and early 1992.

PERSONAL FINANCES - The poll asks: Would you describe the state of your own personal finances these days as excellent, good, not so good or poor? Sixty-seven percent say excellent or good, down one point from last week. The record, 70 percent, was set Aug. 30, 1998 and last matched in January. The worst was 42 percent on March 14, 1993.

BUYING CLIMATE - The poll asks: Considering the cost of things today and your own personal finances, would you say now is an excellent time, a good time, a not-so-good time or a poor time to buy the things you want and need? Fifty-three say excellent or good, up three points from last week. The record, 57 percent, was set Jan. 16, 2000. The worst rating, 20 percent, was set in fall 1990.

METHODOLOGY - The ABC News/Money magazine Consumer Comfort Index represents a rolling average based on telephone interviews with about 1,000 adults nationwide each month. This week's results are based on 1,029 interviews in the week ending July 16 and have an error margin of plus or minus three percentage points. Fieldwork by ICR-International Communications Research of Media, Pa.

The ABC/Money index is derived as follows: The negative response to each index question is subtracted from the positive response to that question. The three resulting numbers are then added and divided by three. The index can range from +100 (everyone positive on all three measures) to -100 (all negative on all three measures). The survey began in December 1985.
