## Most Still Support NATO Raids on Serbia

A majority of Americans continued to support NATO's air strikes against Serbia during the weekend, amid reports of Serbian reprisals against civilians in Kosovo and the United States' loss of an F-117A Stealth fighter jet.

Reports of Serbian reprisals clearly are a cause for concern, however. A plurality of Americans, 48 percent, say they'd regard the air strikes as unsuccessful if the killing of civilians in Kosovo continues, even if Serbia's military strength were seriously damaged.

STRIKES – As things stand, 55 percent support the air strikes in an ABC News/Washington Post poll completed Sunday. While that's down slightly from 60 percent in an ABC News poll Friday night, opposition did not rise appreciably.

VITAL – At the same time, this poll finds a decrease in the view that U.S. vital interests are not at stake in Kosovo. For the first time in ABC and ABC/Post polls, less than half the public expresses that opinion – down from 57 percent two weeks ago. Americans now divide about evenly on the question.

CLINTON – There's no change in Bill Clinton's lukewarm ratings on the matter: Fifty-one percent approve of the way he's handling the situation, same as Friday. Thirty-one percent disapprove.

THE SEXES – There are sharp differences between the sexes. Men support the air strikes by a 2-1 margin, 62 percent to 31 percent. But support declines to half of women (49 percent); 35 percent oppose the action, and women are twice as likely as men to withhold judgment on the issue.

METHODOLOGY - This ABC News/Washington Post poll was conducted by telephone March 26-28, 1999, among a random national sample of 895 adults. The results have a 3.5-point error margin. Field work by ICR Survey Research of Media, Pa.
